

COVID-19 Prevention Program (CPP)

Lakeside Union School District

This CPP is designed to control exposures to the SARS-CoV-2 virus that may occur in our workplace.

Date: 1/21/2021

Authority and Responsibility

Ty Bryson has overall authority and responsibility for implementing the provisions of this CPP in our workplace. In addition, all managers and supervisors are responsible for implementing and maintaining the CPP in their assigned work areas and for ensuring employees receive answers to questions about the program in a language they understand.

All employees are responsible for using safe work practices, following all directives, policies and procedures, and assisting in maintaining a safe work environment.

Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards

We will implement the following in our workplace:

- Conduct workplace-specific evaluations using the Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19 Hazards form.
- Evaluate employees' potential workplace exposures to all persons at, or who may enter, our workplace.
- Review applicable orders and general and industry-specific guidance from the State of California, Cal/OSHA, and the local health department related to COVID-19 hazards and prevention.
- Evaluate existing COVID-19 prevention controls in our workplace and the need for different or additional controls.
- Conduct periodic inspections using the Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections form as needed to identify unhealthy conditions, work practices, and work procedures related to COVID-19 and to ensure compliance with our COVID-19 policies and procedures.

Lakeside Union School District has created a District Advisory Committee (DAC) that includes all stakeholders including administration, certificated staff, classified staff, parents, technology, and Maintenance, Operations and Transportation. DAC meets on a regular basis to go over plans, discuss the state of current events, and to review procedures and protocols that are in place.

This plan is a living document, and will evolve based on changes in guidance from governmental health and safety organizations.

The District has developed a cleaning program based on CDE and state public health guidelines. Specifically, the District will be using cleaning products that are on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of approved disinfectants for use against SARS/CoV2 (COVID-19) and consistent with ventilation requirements, Health Schools Act requirements, and

Cal/OSHA and CDPH requirements. All custodians have been trained by the Director of Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation. Once a week, after students are dismissed, each classroom, restrooms and other facilities, transportation included, used by students and staff will undergo deep cleaning by trained custodial/transportation driving staff with the use of the Electrostatic Sprayer with Bioesque Botanical Disinfectant Solution.

Employee Participation

Employees and their authorized employees' representatives are encouraged to participate in the identification and evaluation of COVID-19 hazards by:

Lakeside Union School District has created a District Advisory Committee (DAC) that includes all stakeholders including administration, certificated staff, classified staff, parents, technology, and Maintenance, Operations and Transportation. DAC meets on a regular basis to go over plans, discuss the state of current events, and to review procedures and protocols that are in place.

Employee Screening

We screen our employees by:

LUSD utilize the "StopIt Safe Screen" web based screening for employees. Each employee will utilize the web based screening before coming onto campus. If the employee receives a do not enter, the school nurse or other personnel will follow-up with employee to determine if they are or are not safe to be on site for the day.

Correction of COVID-19 Hazards

Unsafe or unhealthy work conditions, practices or procedures will be documented on the Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections form, and corrected in a timely manner based on the severity of the hazards, as follows:

Lakeside is conducting weekly inspections of work spaces for potential exposure using Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections. Administration makes sure that employees maintain at least 6' of working distance between them at all time, hand washing/ disinfecting stations are in use, work areas are properly disinfected, and that all PPE are available and being used appropriately. Break areas are arranged so that social distancing of 6' or more is maintained. Administration Also ensures that buildings maintain proper barriers, ventilation, and additional room air filtration or working properly.

Controls of COVID-19 Hazards

Physical Distancing

Where possible, we ensure at least six feet of physical distancing at all times in our workplace by:

Lakeside has reduced the number of employees required to be on campus. Office staff have been placed on a rotating schedule or a work from home status. Visitors have been reduced to only 1 person allowed with a student and by appointment only. All areas have been equipped with proper signage notifying people to maintain social distancing and to remind to utilize safe practices such as wearing face masks and washing hands.

Individuals will be kept as far apart as possible when there are situations where six feet of physical distancing cannot be achieved.

Face Coverings

We provide clean, undamaged face coverings and ensure they are properly worn by employees over the nose and mouth when indoors, and when outdoors and less than six feet away from another person, including non-employees, and where required by orders from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) or local health department.

All employees are allowed to wear their own face masks and are encouraged to wash and clean them regularly. Lakeside also provides all staff with disposable face masks to be worn while at work. Employees are required to wear face masks while at work. Employees who refuse to wear a mask will not be allowed to stay on campus.

The following are exceptions to the use of face coverings in our workplace:

- When an employee is alone in a room.
- While eating and drinking at the workplace, provided employees are at least six feet apart and outside air supply to the area, if indoors, has been maximized to the extent possible.
- Employees wearing respiratory protection in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 5144 or other safety orders.
- Employees who cannot wear face coverings due to a medical or mental health condition or disability, or who are hearing-impaired or communicating with a hearing-impaired person. Alternatives will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- Specific tasks that cannot feasibly be performed with a face covering, where employees will be kept at least six feet apart.

Any employee not wearing a face covering, face shield with a drape or other effective alternative, or respiratory protection, for any reason, shall be at least six feet apart from all other persons.

Engineering controls

We implement the following measures for situations where we cannot maintain at least six feet between individuals:

Each site has been equipped with plexiglass barriers at the front counter of each office. Desks/work areas have been equipped with plexiglass barriers. All student desks have been equipped with plexiglass barriers.

We maximize, to the extent feasible, the quantity of outside air for our buildings with mechanical or natural ventilation systems by:

Each room has been equipped with air-filtration equipment that circulates and cleans the air in each room every 30 minutes. Additionally, open doors and windows are encouraged when the conditions are appropriate to do so.

Cleaning and disinfecting

We implement the following cleaning and disinfection measures for frequently touched surfaces:

The District has developed a cleaning program based on CDE and state public health guidelines. Specifically, the District will be using cleaning products that are on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of approved disinfectants for use COVID-19 Prevention Program

against SARS/CoV2 (COVID-19) and consistent with ventilation requirements, Health Schools Act requirements, and Cal/OSHA and CDPH requirements. All custodians have been trained by the Director of Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation. Once a week, after students are dismissed, each classroom, restrooms and other facilities, transportation included, used by students and staff will undergo deep cleaning by trained custodial/transportation driving staff with the use of the Electrostatic Sprayer with Bioesque Botanical Disinfectant Solution.

Should we have a COVID-19 case in our workplace, we will implement the following procedures:

The District has developed a cleaning program based on CDE and state public health guidelines. Specifically, the District will be using cleaning products that are on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of approved disinfectants for use against SARS/CoV2 (COVID-19) and consistent with ventilation requirements, Health Schools Act requirements, and Cal/OSHA and CDPH requirements. All custodians have been trained by the Director of Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation. Each day, after students are dismissed, each classroom, restrooms and other facilities, transportation included, used by students and staff will undergo deep cleaning by trained custodial/transportation driving staff with the use of the Electrostatic Sprayer with Bioesque Botanical Disinfectant Solution.

Shared tools, equipment and personal protective equipment (PPE)

PPE must not be shared, e.g., gloves, goggles and face shields.

Items that employees come in regular physical contact with, such as phones, headsets, desks, keyboards, writing materials, instruments and tools must also not be shared, to the extent feasible. Where there must be sharing, the items will be disinfected between uses by:

Shared workspaces will be avoided (desks, offices, and cubicles) and work items (phones, computers, other work tools, and equipment) when possible. If they must be shared, workspaces and work items will be cleaned and disinfected before and after each use. Procedures have been established to routinely clean and disinfect commonly touched objects and surfaces such as handrails, copy machines, faucets, and doorknobs. Surfaces should be cleaned with soap and water prior to disinfection.

These procedures include:

Using disinfectants that are EPA-approved for use against the virus that causes COVID-19.

Providing EPA-registered disposable wipes for employees to wipe down commonly used surfaces before and after each use.

Following the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products (e.g., safety requirements, PPE, concentration, contact time).

Ensuring there are adequate supplies to support cleaning and disinfection practices.

Sharing of vehicles will be minimized to the extent feasible, and high-touch points (for example, steering wheel, door handles, seatbelt buckles, armrests, shifter, etc.) will be disinfected between users.

Hand sanitizing

In order to implement effective hand sanitizing procedures, we:

Washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, after interacting with other persons and after contacting shared surfaces or objects. As noted above, Executive Order N-51-20 requires that employees working in food facilities

(as defined by the California Retail Food Code) must be permitted to wash their hands every 30 minutes and additionally, as needed.

Personal protective equipment (PPE) used to control employees' exposure to COVID-19

We evaluate the need for PPE (such as gloves, goggles, and face shields) as required by CCR Title 8, section 3380, and provide such PPE as needed.

When it comes to respiratory protection, we evaluate the need in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 5144 when the physical distancing requirements are not feasible or maintained. [reference section 3205(c)(E) for details on required respirator and eye protection use.]

We provide and ensure use of eye protection and respiratory protection in accordance with section 5144 when employees are exposed to procedures that may aerosolize potentially infectious material such as saliva or respiratory tract fluids.

Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases

This will be accomplished by using the Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases form.

Employees who had potential COVID-19 exposure in our workplace will be:

Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 cases will be completed using Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases. After completing an investigation, the district nurse will provide staff who have been exposed a list of testing sites that are available at no charge and will encourage them to be tested. Nurse will also provide information on symptoms to look for, timelines for returning to work, when to self quarantine, and what to do when becoming symptomatic.

System for Communicating

Our goal is to ensure that we have effective two-way communication with our employees, in a form they can readily understand, and that it includes the following information:

- Who employees should report COVID-19 symptoms and possible hazards to, and how:

Employees are able to report symptoms online through the StopIt Safe Screen web based application. If symptoms are reported, each individual will receive a Do-not enter. District Nurse, Health technician, or administration will follow up with each person that receives a DO-NOT Enter status.

- That employees can report symptoms and hazards without fear of reprisal.
- Our procedures or policies for accommodating employees with medical or other conditions that put them at increased risk of severe COVID-19 illness.
- Where testing is not required, how employees can access COVID-19 testing:

The District Nurse will keep up-to-date information on county COVID-19 testing sites. As of October 1, 2020 there are six free county testing sites with testing turnaround time: average two days, with some sites taking up to ten days.

- In the event we are required to provide testing because of a workplace exposure or outbreak, we will communicate the plan for providing testing and inform affected employees of the reason for the testing and the possible consequences of a positive test.

The District Nurse will keep up-to-date information on county COVID-19 testing sites. As of October 1, 2020 there are six free county testing sites with testing turnaround time: average two days, with some sites taking up to ten days.

- Information about COVID-19 hazards employees (including other employers and individuals in contact with our workplace) may be exposed to, what is being done to control those hazards, and our COVID-19 policies and procedures.

Training and Instruction

We will provide effective training and instruction that includes:

- Our COVID-19 policies and procedures to protect employees from COVID-19 hazards.
- Information regarding COVID-19-related benefits to which the employee may be entitled under applicable federal, state, or local laws.
- The fact that:
 - COVID-19 is an infectious disease that can be spread through the air.
 - COVID-19 may be transmitted when a person touches a contaminated object and then touches their eyes, nose, or mouth.
 - An infectious person may have no symptoms.
- Methods of physical distancing of at least six feet and the importance of combining physical distancing with the wearing of face coverings.
- The fact that particles containing the virus can travel more than six feet, especially indoors, so physical distancing must be combined with other controls, including face coverings and hand hygiene, to be effective.
- The importance of frequent hand washing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and using hand sanitizer when employees do not have immediate access to a sink or hand washing facility, and that hand sanitizer does not work if the hands are soiled.
- Proper use of face coverings and the fact that face coverings are not respiratory protective equipment - face coverings are intended to primarily protect other individuals from the wearer of the face covering.
- COVID-19 symptoms, and the importance of obtaining a COVID-19 test and not coming to work if the employee has COVID-19 symptoms.

All staff will receive a Health and Wellness Training provided by COVID-19 Response Coordinator and/or the COVID-19 Response Team. The training will include which symptoms to look for, how to take a temperature, and when to contact the District Nurse for further evaluation. Staff have also been provided an informational Health Screening Folder for reference. All students who have specific needs related to safety have had appropriate adjustments related to their specific plan.

All staff have been trained on and will teach, model, and assist students with proper hygiene practices including handwashing and hand sanitizing and PPE/EPG. Staff will model, and assist students with proper hygiene practices including how to properly not touch the face or face covering, use tissue to wipe the nose and cover the cough as well as sneezing inside the tissue.

Any health and/or safety concerns will be reported to the site administrator or the COVID-19 Coordinator, our District Nurse. Anyone having medical conditions who are unable to wear face covering will have access to the greatest extent possible, face shields with a cloth drape.

Employees are provided training in a language that is readily understandable by all employees on the following topics through www.getssafetytrained.com COVID-19 School-Based Training. The completion of this training is tracked and requires employees to submit responses to questions. The School-Based training contains all of the following: General description of COVID-19, symptoms, when to seek medical attention, how to prevent its spread, and the employer's procedures for preventing its spread at the workplace.

How an infected person can spread COVID-19 to others even if they are not sick.

How to prevent the spread of COVID-19 by using cloth face covers, including:

Center for Disease Control guidelines state that everyone should use cloth face covers (provided by district) when around other persons.

How cloth face covers can help protect persons around the user when combined with physical distancing and frequent hand washing.

that cloth face covers are not protective equipment and do not protect the person wearing a cloth face cover from COVID-19.

Instructions on washing and sanitizing hands before and after using face coverings, which should be washed after each shift.

Cough and sneeze etiquette.

Washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, after interacting with other persons and after contacting shared surfaces or objects. As noted above, Executive Order N-51-20 requires that employees working in food facilities (as defined by the California Retail Food Code) must be permitted to wash their hands every 30 minutes and additionally, as needed.

Avoiding touching eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Avoiding sharing personal items with co-workers (i.e., dishes, cups, utensils, towels).

Providing tissues, no-touch disposal trash cans and hand sanitizer for use by employees.

Safely using cleaners and disinfectants, which includes:

The hazards of the cleaners and disinfectants used at the worksite.

Wearing PPE (such as face masks and gloves).

Ensuring cleaners and disinfectants are used in a manner that does not endanger employees

Appendix D: COVID-19 Training Roster will be used to document this training.

Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases

Where we have a COVID-19 case in our workplace, we will limit transmission by:

- Ensuring that COVID-19 cases are excluded from the workplace until our return-to-work requirements are met.

- Excluding employees with COVID-19 exposure from the workplace for 14 days after the last known COVID-19 exposure to a COVID-19 case.
- Continuing and maintaining an employee's earnings, seniority, and all other employee rights and benefits whenever we've demonstrated that the COVID-19 exposure is work related. This will be accomplished by

Employees who are deemed high risk by their primary care physician may submit a written explanation of risk and a request for accommodations. Lakeside Union School District will provide appropriate accommodations to staff including additional PPE such as gowns, gloves, N95 masks or other necessary PPE adding additional layers of protection. Staff are required to contact their site supervisor immediately if they are at higher risk of severe illness (medical conditions that the CDC says may have increased risks) or who cannot safely distance from household contacts at higher risk by providing options, following the Family First Corona Virus Response Act. Staff are not to report to the worksite if they are ill, or experiencing any of the symptoms on the Health Screening Form. Staff member who indicates a concern on the Health Screening Form will contact the District Nurse for additional screening and recommendations.

- Providing employees at the time of exclusion with information on available benefits.

Reporting, Recordkeeping, and Access

It is our policy to:

- Report information about COVID-19 cases at our workplace to the local health department whenever required by law, and provide any related information requested by the local health department.
- Report immediately to Cal/OSHA any COVID-19-related serious illnesses or death, as defined under CCR Title 8 section 330(h), of an employee occurring in our place of employment or in connection with any employment.
- Maintain records of the steps taken to implement our written COVID-19 Prevention Program in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 3203(b).
- Make our written COVID-19 Prevention Program available at the workplace to employees, authorized employee representatives, and to representatives of Cal/OSHA immediately upon request.
- Use the **Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases** form to keep a record of and track all COVID-19 cases. The information will be made available to employees, authorized employee representatives, or as otherwise required by law, with personal identifying information removed.

Return-to-Work Criteria

- COVID-19 cases with COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until all the following have occurred:
 - At least 24 hours have passed since a fever of 99.5 or higher has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medications.
 - COVID-19 symptoms have improved.
 - At least 10 days have passed since COVID-19 symptoms first appeared.
- COVID-19 cases who tested positive but never developed COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until a minimum of 10 days have passed since the date of specimen collection of their first positive COVID-19 test.
- A negative COVID-19 test will not be required for an employee to return to work.
- If an order to isolate or quarantine an employee is issued by a local or state health official, the employee will not return to work until the period of isolation or quarantine is completed or the order is lifted. If no period was

specified, then the period will be 10 days from the time the order to isolate was effective, or 14 days from the time the order to quarantine was effective.

Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19 Hazards

All persons, regardless of symptoms or negative COVID-19 test results, will be considered potentially infectious. Particular attention will be paid to areas where people may congregate or come in contact with one another, regardless of whether employees are performing an assigned work task or not. For example: meetings, entrances, bathrooms, hallways, aisles, walkways, elevators, break or eating areas, cool-down areas, and waiting areas.

Evaluation of potential workplace exposure will be to all persons at the workplace or who may enter the workplace, including coworkers, employees of other entities, members of the public, customers or clients, and independent contractors. We will consider how employees and other persons enter, leave, and travel through the workplace, in addition to addressing fixed work locations.

All COVID-19 testing or related medical services provided by us will be provided in a manner that ensures the confidentiality of employees, with the exception of unredacted information on COVID-19 cases that will be provided immediately upon request to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), or as otherwise required by law.

All employees' medical records will also be kept confidential and not disclosed or reported without the employee's express written consent to any person within or outside the workplace, with the following exceptions: (1) Unredacted medical records provided to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, NIOSH, or as otherwise required by law immediately upon request; and (2) Records that do not contain individually identifiable medical information or from which individually identifiable medical information has been removed.

Additional Consideration #1

Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

- We will provide COVID-19 testing to all employees in our exposed workplace except for employees who were not present during the period of an outbreak identified by a local health department or the relevant 14-day period. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.
- COVID-19 testing consists of the following:
 - All employees in our exposed workplace will be immediately tested and then tested again one week later. Negative COVID-19 test results of employees with COVID-19 exposure will not impact the duration of any quarantine period required by, or orders issued by, the local health department.
 - After the first two COVID-19 tests, we will continue to provide COVID-19 testing of employees who remain at the workplace at least once per week, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.
 - We will provide additional testing when deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

We will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees who had COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases** and **Return to Work Criteria** requirements, and local health officer orders if applicable.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illness

We will immediately investigate and determine possible workplace-related factors that contributed to the COVID-19 outbreak in accordance with our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.

COVID-19 investigation, review and hazard correction

In addition to our CPP **Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards** and **Correction of COVID-19 Hazards**, we will immediately perform a review of potentially relevant COVID-19 policies, procedures, and controls and implement changes as needed to prevent further spread of COVID-19.

The investigation and review will be documented and include:

- Investigation of new or unabated COVID-19 hazards including:
 - Our leave policies and practices and whether employees are discouraged from remaining home when sick.
 - Our COVID-19 testing policies.
 - Insufficient outdoor air.
 - Insufficient air filtration.
 - Lack of physical distancing.
- Updating the review:
 - Every thirty days that the outbreak continues.
 - In response to new information or to new or previously unrecognized COVID-19 hazards.
 - When otherwise necessary.

- Implementing changes to reduce the transmission of COVID-19 based on the investigation and review. We will consider:
 - Moving indoor tasks outdoors or having them performed remotely.
 - Increasing outdoor air supply when work is done indoors.
 - Improving air filtration.
 - Increasing physical distancing as much as possible.
 - Respiratory protection.

Notifications to the local health department

- Immediately, but no longer than 48 hours after learning of three or more COVID-19 cases in our workplace, we will contact the local health department for guidance on preventing the further spread of COVID-19 within the workplace.
- We will provide to the local health department the total number of COVID-19 cases and for each COVID-19 case, the name, contact information, occupation, workplace location, business address, the hospitalization and/or fatality status, and North American Industry Classification System code of the workplace of the COVID-19 case, and any other information requested by the local health department. We will continue to give notice to the local health department of any subsequent COVID-19 cases at our workplace.

Additional Consideration #2

Major COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

We will provide twice a week COVID-19 testing, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, to all employees present at our exposed workplace during the relevant 30-day period(s) and who remain at the workplace. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

We will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees with COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases and Return to Work Criteria**, and any relevant local health department orders.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illnesses

We will comply with the requirements of our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.

COVID-19 hazard correction

In addition to the requirements of our CPP **Correction of COVID-19 Hazards**, we will take the following actions:

- In buildings or structures with mechanical ventilation, we will filter recirculated air with Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value (MERV) 13 or higher efficiency filters if compatible with the ventilation system. If MERV-13 or higher filters are not compatible with the ventilation system, we will use filters with the highest compatible filtering efficiency. We will also evaluate whether portable or mounted High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filtration units, or other air cleaning systems would reduce the risk of transmission and implement their use to the degree feasible.
- We will determine the need for a respiratory protection program or changes to an existing respiratory protection program under CCR Title 8 section 5144 to address COVID-19 hazards.
- We will evaluate whether to halt some or all operations at our workplace until COVID-19 hazards have been corrected
- Implement any other control measures deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Notifications to the local health department

We will comply with the requirements of our **Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks-Notifications to the Local Health Department**.

Additional Consideration #3

COVID-19 Prevention in Employer-Provided Housing

Assignment of housing units

We will ensure that shared housing unit assignments are prioritized in the following order:

- Residents who usually maintain a household together outside of work, such as family members, will be housed in the same housing unit without other persons.
- Residents who work in the same crew or work together at the same worksite will be housed in the same housing unit without other persons.
- Employees who do not usually maintain a common household, work crew, or worksite will be housed in the same housing unit only when no other housing alternatives are possible.

Physical distancing and controls

We will ensure:

- The premises are of sufficient size and layout to permit at least six feet of physical distancing between residents in housing units, common areas, and other areas of the premises.
- Beds are spaced at least six feet apart in all directions and positioned to maximize the distance between sleepers' heads. For beds positioned next to each other, i.e., side by side, the beds will be arranged so that the head of one bed is next to the foot of the next bed. For beds positioned across from each other, i.e., end to end, the beds will be arranged so that the foot of one bed is closest to the foot of the next bed. Bunk beds will not be used.
- Maximization of the quantity and supply of outdoor air and increase filtration efficiency to the highest level compatible with the existing ventilation system in housing units.

Face coverings

We will provide face coverings to all residents and provide information to residents on when they should be used in accordance with state or local health officer orders or guidance.

Cleaning and disinfection

We will ensure that:

- Housing units, kitchens, bathrooms, and common areas are effectively cleaned and disinfected at least once a day to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Cleaning and disinfecting shall be done in a manner that protects the privacy of residents.
- Unwashed dishes, drinking glasses, cups, eating utensils, and similar items are not shared.

Screening

We will encourage residents to report COVID-19 symptoms to:

COVID-19 testing

We will establish, implement, and maintain effective policies and procedures for COVID-19 testing of occupants who had a COVID-19 exposure, who have COVID-19 symptoms, or as recommended by the local health department.

Isolation of COVID-19 cases and persons with COVID-19 exposure

We will:

- Effectively isolate COVID-19 exposed residents from all other occupants. Effective isolation will include providing COVID-19 exposed residents with a private bathroom, sleeping area, and cooking and eating facility.
- Effectively isolate COVID-19 cases from all occupants who are not COVID-19 cases. Effective isolation will include housing COVID-19 cases only with other COVID-19 cases, and providing COVID-19 case occupants with a sleeping area, bathroom, and cooking and eating facility that is not shared by non-COVID-19-case occupants.
- Keep confidential any personal identifying information regarding COVID-19 cases and persons with COVID-19 symptoms, in accordance with our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.
- End isolation in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases and Return to Work Criteria**, and any applicable local or state health officer orders.

Additional Consideration #4

COVID-19 Prevention in Employer-Provided Transportation to and from Work

Assignment of transportation

We will prioritize shared transportation assignments in the following order:

- Employees residing in the same housing unit will be transported in the same vehicle.
- Employees working in the same crew or worksite will be transported in the same vehicle.
- Employees who do not share the same household, work crew or worksite will be transported in the same vehicle only when no other transportation alternatives are possible.

Physical distancing and face coverings

We will ensure that the:

- Physical distancing and face covering requirements of our CPP **Physical Distancing** and **Face Coverings** are followed for employees waiting for transportation.
- Vehicle operator and any passengers are separated by at least three feet in all directions during the operation of the vehicle, regardless of the vehicle's normal capacity. Vehicle operator and any passengers are provided and wear a face covering in the vehicle as required by our CPP **Face Coverings**.

Screening

We will develop, implement, and maintain effective procedures for screening and excluding drivers and riders with COVID-19 symptoms prior to boarding shared transportation.

Cleaning and disinfecting

We will ensure that:

- All high-contact surfaces (door handles, seatbelt buckles, armrests, etc.) used by passengers are cleaned and disinfected before each trip.
- All high-contact surfaces used by drivers, such as the steering wheel, armrests, seatbelt buckles, door handles and shifter, are cleaned and disinfected between different drivers.
- We provide sanitizing materials, training on how to use them properly, and ensure they are kept in adequate supply.

Ventilation

We will ensure that vehicle windows are kept open, and the ventilation system set to maximize outdoor air and not set to recirculate air. Windows do not have to be kept open if one or more of the following conditions exist:

- The vehicle has functioning air conditioning in use and the outside temperature is greater than 90 degrees Fahrenheit.
- The vehicle has functioning heating in use and the outside temperature is less than 60 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Protection is needed from weather conditions, such as rain or snow.
- The vehicle has a cabin air filter in use and the U.S. EPA Air Quality Index for any pollutant is greater than 100.

Hand hygiene

We will provide hand sanitizer in each vehicle and ensure that all drivers and riders sanitize their hands before entering and exiting the vehicle. Hand sanitizers with methyl alcohol are prohibited.
